Broken Harbour, Tana French. On one of the half-abandoned "luxury" developments that litter Ireland, two children and their father are dead and the mother is on her way to intensive care. At first, it seems like a simple case: Pat Spain was a casualty of the recession, so he killed his children, tried to kill his wife, and finished off with himself. Get Out. A young black man meets his white girlfriend's parents for the first time at their secluded estate. At first, her family's overly accommodating behaviour seems like a nervous attempt to deal with an interracial relationship, but as the weekend progresses, a series of increasingly disturbing discoveries leads to a nightmare he could never have imagined. Family tensions erupt in the midst of preparations for their second son's wedding when the elder son announces he is moving out as well.
