




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## **About Royal MTC**

When the Winnipeg Little Theatre and Theatre 77 merged to form the Manitoba Theatre Centre in 1958, the goal was to produce great theatre with mass appeal. Artistic Director John Hirsch and General Manager Tom Hendry staged professional productions of an eclectic array of plays – classics, Broadway hits and new Canadian work. With the establishment of a second stage for experimental work in 1960, and an annual provincial tour that began in 1961, MTC fully realized the original vision of a centre for theatre in Manitoba. Inspired by the breadth and quality of MTC's programming, a whole network of what became known as "regional theatres" emerged across North America.

The company produces in two venues: the Warehouse, which opened in 1969, and the Mainstage, completed in 1970. The theatres were renamed after the company's founders in 2008. In 2009, the Government of Canada designated the Mainstage a National Historic Site and, in 2010, Queen Elizabeth II granted the company a royal designation.

Today, the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre produces 10 plays on two stages, a regional tour, a wide range of youth programming and two annual festivals: Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work (founded in 2021) and North America's second-largest Fringe Festival (founded in 1988). Attendance for Royal MTC programming averages 300,000 each year, and many Manitobans also support Royal MTC with donations and volunteer time. Under the leadership of Artistic Director Kelly Thornton and Executive Director Evan Klassen, Royal MTC remains Manitoba's flagship theatre.



#### MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As I write this - exactly one year after beginning my tenure as Executive Director of the Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre - I am filled with gratitude and admiration. This role marks my return to the theatre after a long career that began 27 years ago in MTC's box office, continued as a stage manager on both our stages, and has now brought me full circle to lead this extraordinary organization. To return in this capacity is both humbling and deeply meaningful.

Reflecting on my first season offers both clarity and gratitude: clarity about the exceptional work on and off our stages, and gratitude for everyone who makes MTC what it is. From my first day, I was enthusiastically welcomed by artists, staff, volunteers, audiences and supporters. That generosity of spirit is the heartbeat of Royal MTC and what makes it such an integral part of our city and province.

The first MTC event I attended was Pimootayowin in September 2024, where new Indigenous writers share their first plays aloud. Pimootayowin means "journey" in Anishinaabemowin, and it reflects MTC's own journey toward reconciliation. Beginning my tenure with this program set a powerful tone for the year – rooted in truth, artistry, and community connection.

I owe deep thanks to Kelly Thornton, our Artistic Director, whose leadership, collaboration, and care made this season a true partnership. I'm also grateful to our Board of Trustees, especially co-chairs Laurie Speers and John Guttormson, for their confidence and steady guidance. Our senior staff team deserves special recognition for embracing change with creativity and passion, shaping ideas that will resonate for years to come.

I also want to acknowledge my predecessor, Camilla Holland, who left MTC in an extraordinary position as one of Manitoba's leading arts organizations. In her final year, her tireless efforts helped secure a significant federal investment through PrairiesCan, strengthening our ability to deliver programs and expand our reach.

This season brought remarkable stories to our stages - sparking conversation, laughter and reflection. We championed local and national voices, welcomed bold new work, and reimagined classics. Offstage, our education and community engagement programs deepened connections, inviting new generations to discover the magic of live theatre.

Theatre has always been a place where we gather to explore who we are, wrestle with big questions, imagine new possibilities, and do it together. As we look ahead, I'm excited to build on the strong foundation we share, ensuring Royal MTC remains a place where everyone feels they belong.

Thank you for making my first season unforgettable. I look forward to many more nights in the theatre with all of you.

Murder for Two, this year's Regional Tour, visited 20 COMMUNITIES in Manitoba and Ontario, delighting 3,228 AUDIENCE MEMBERS.

Every year, the Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival presents independent theatre by hosting MORE THAN 140 PRODUCTIONS at accessible prices over 12 DAYS.

Facility tours to OVER 150 PEOPLE during Culture Days on September 28 and MORE THAN 200 PEOPLE from 15 schools, community groups and businesses throughout the season. These tours provide a deeper dive into how theatre is created on the Mainstage by the many talented theatre artists and technicians employed by MTC.

The Theatre for Young Audience program welcomed **7,272 STUDENTS** from schools around Manitoba to enjoy plays on both stages this season.

Young people aged 18-29 have access to world-class theatre thanks to the Theatre Under 30 program, which offered **2,317 TICKETS** for just \$20 a seat this season.


Everyone who attends MTC can enhance their theatre experience with pre-show chats, post-show talkbacks and enrichment guides.

MTC continues to offer performances with reduced barriers. This past season shows were offered with open captions, ASL interpretation, live audio descriptions and relaxed performance environments.



On more than **200 DAYS EVERY YEAR**, MTC presents extraordinary theatre that aims to inspire, illuminate and ignite critical conversation. The plays offered by MTC provide a balance of stories, ensuring that voices within our community and across many generations are heard. This past season, audiences were treated to fun outings at the theatre with *The Play That Goes Wrong* and *Murder for Two*, exposed to heartwarming narratives with *Mix Tapes From My Mom, The Recipe* and *Waitress*, and reminded of profound historic events in *Indecent* and *Casey and Diana*.

This magic of storytelling is made possible not only thanks to the actors and artistic teams, but also because of the hands of many talented craftspeople, designers and technicians who create incredibly complex sets, sew beautiful garments that reflect the 1800s to modern day and construct pies that look delicious enough to eat.

## Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival

The Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival ended its 37th festival on a high note, literally, with a Broadway singalong at Old Market Square. The Fringe hosted performing companies from near and far, bringing Winnipeg together to enjoy indie theatre in a city-wide celebration.

The festival featured 148 indoor companies and 1,230 performances, including 126 sell-outs. Total indoor attendance was 81,224, a 13% increase over last year. This year's Fringe returned \$811,206 in box office revenue to the performing companies.

The Manitoba Association of Playwrights (MAP) presented the 2024 Harry S. Rintoul Award for Best New Manitoba Play to A Taste of Blood in the Mouth by Kinsey Donald. The honourable mention went to The Mailroom by JHG Creative (Cuinn Joseph, Connor Joseph, Monique Gauthier & Ian Ingram).

## Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work

Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work held its 4th year of free public play readings at the Tom Hendry Warehouse. The five-day festival, which ran from September 23-27, 2024, was the culmination of months of hard work from this year's Pimootayowin Creators Circle cohort. Led by Governor General Award-winning playwright lan Ross, the Pimootayowin Creators Circle supports the creation and development of new plays by Manitoba-based Indigenous artists.

The presented works included *The Buffalo in the Room* by Erin McGregor, *Anyway* by Gabriel Daniels, *Pieces* by Mark Head, *Love Louis* by Victoria Perrie, *In the Shadows Beyond the Pines* by Rhonda Apetagon and *Big Wind: Is That an Indian Agent I Smell?* by Jordan McPeek. Rhonda Apetagon will continue to refine her piece, which will be featured in our 2025/26 season at the Tom Hendry Warehouse.

This year, the Pimootayowin Creators Circle celebrated the world premiere of *ELEVATE*: *Manaaji'idiwin* by David McLeod. Developed in 2020, *ELEVATE* is the second play from the Pimootayowin Creators Circle to be produced at the John Hirsch Mainstage.

The next Pimootayowin: A Festival of New Work will be presented from September 22-27, 2025.

#### **NEW CREATIONS**

## Literary Development

Royal MTC is proud to continue its commitment to the creation and development of new work by local and national artists. Since 2020 the Pimootayowin Creators Circle has brought together six storytellers under the leadership of Governor General Award-winning playwright lan Ross to develop playwriting skills, culminating in public presentations of works in development. The 2024/25 cohort consisted of Andrea Friesen, Dannielle Morrisseau, Donnie Osler, Julia Ross, Kirby Fults and Martha Troian. The Pimootayowin Creators Circle was generously sponsored by **TD Ready Commitment**.

Royal MTC provided additional funding and workshops to three plays, The Buffalo in the Room by Erin McGregor, Big Wind: Is there an Indian Agent in the Room? by Jordan McPeek, and In the Shadow Beyond the Pines by Rhonda Apetagon which will receive its world premiere in the 2025/26 Tom Hendry Warehouse season.

In preparation for the 2024/25 season, Royal MTC provided development funding and dramaturgy for *Little Women* by Jordi Mand and *ELEVATE: Manaaji'idiwin* by David McLeod. We continued support for *Intrepid* by Alex Poch Goldin and provided new seed funding to Christopher Morris for the development of *Katya & Marichka*, a new play in development by Human Cargo Theatre. To support additional national projects, Royal MTC contributed to The Musical Stage Company's new incubation initiative which provided a post-premiere developmental workshop for *Kelly v. Kelly*, with book by Sara Farb and music and lyrics by Britta Johnson.

We are thrilled to have continued the development of *Rizal*, a new musical by Joseph Aragon, with a 10-day workshop in November 2024. Led by director and dramaturg Nina Lee Aquino, this workshop focused on ongoing dramaturgy and the addition of new musical numbers.

## **National Mentorship Program**


Since 2020, Royal MTC has been dedicated to the development of local Manitoban theatre artists by providing networking support on a national scale. Designed to overcome the geographic isolation of the prairies and to build a web of connections and opportunities, the National Mentorship Program celebrated its fifth year of nurturing the brightest emerging local talent. Following the selection of ten mentees, and pairing them with mentors across Canada, one-on-one meetings took place between January and June of 2025.

## **Pre-Show Chats**

This informal lecture series is free to attend for ticket-holders to the third Thursday evening of our Mainstage season. Patrons enrich their experience through pre-show, behind-the-scenes conversations with theatre professionals and special guests from our community. Over the course of the season, **211 PATRONS** joined us to enjoy the following:

**THE PLAY THAT GOES WRONG** • Fight Director extraordinaire Jacquie Loewen spoke about her role and gave some bonus information about working on *The Recipe*.

**LITTLE WOMEN** • Director Katie German talked about the design collaboration process and script workshops, and gave the audience some "Easter eggs" to look out for.

**WAITRESS** • Kelly Robinson, Assistant Music Director, covered the audition and rehearsal process, contributions of a music director, some tidbits about playing in the band, and some musical phrases to listen for.

**INDECENT** • Itay Zutra gave insight from his perspective as Yiddish consultant about the language, history, and culture.

**CASEY AND DIANA** • After a mini-tour of MTC's workshops, activist Jim Kane shared his journey with HIV/AIDS and the history of organizations in Manitoba.

**ELEVATE** • MTC's Technical Director Donnie Osler revealed incidences of stage magic from throughout the season and introduced audience members to his important but often mis-understood role.

## **Talkbacks**

Post-show, actors returned to the stage for a question-and-answer session with the audience. Talkbacks were hosted after the first Tuesday evening performance and second Wednesday matinee at the Mainstage, and after the first Tuesday evening performance and Thursday matinee at the Warehouse. At a total of 21 public Talkbacks, over 1,000 PATRONS are estimated to have participated.

Our Talkback Facilitator volunteers were Aaron Penner, Brandon Christopher, Christopher Brauer, Jack Fraser, Jeff Hirsch and Katrina Dunn.

## Low Vision Friendly Performance (New!)

For the first time, Royal MTC designated a production as "low vision friendly." These are shows that can be well-understood, at least 90%, by dialogue alone. Written and audio pre-show and intermission introductions outline set and costume design, give examples of the actors' voices, and pre-emptively explain any sight gags so that all audience members are in on the joke. These can be listened to on our website in advance and via QR code at the venue. The introduction to LVF shows was available by the Tuesday after opening, which means that no matter which performance you attend after that point, you can access this accessibility feature. This year Education and Enrichment Manager Ksenia Broda-Milian created this material for *King James*.

## **Relaxed Performance**

Royal MTC offered a relaxed performance of *Little Women* at the Mainstage December 6, 2024. This is the sixth season Royal MTC has engaged in this accessibility initiative, which is designed to welcome audience members who would benefit from a more relaxed environment, including those on the autism spectrum. A detailed pre-show announcement prepares audience members for content and startling effects, and there is a relaxed attitude towards audience noise and movement. All patrons were invited to come, be themselves and experience live theatre.

## **Open Caption Performance**

Royal MTC's Open Caption Performance of *The Play That Goes Wrong* was offered on October 18, 2024. An electronic text display was positioned at the in the balcony to show that section of the audience what the actors were saying or singing and describe sound effects on stage. This benefits not only those patrons who are Deaf or hard of hearing, but also enhances the performance for the hearing audience as a whole who may have missed a word, phrase, joke or lyric.



## **ASL-Interpreted Performances**

Royal MTC offered American Sign Language Interpreted performances of *Little Women* on December 8, 2024 and Casey and Diana on April 10, 2025. ASL users and members of the Deaf community sit in seats with clear sightlines to take in the interpreter and the action onstage.

## **Audio Described Performance**

Royal MTC offered Audio Described performances of *The Recipe* on November 21, 2024 (in partnership with Theatre Projects Manitoba), *Waitress* on January 29, 2025 and *Murder for Two* on April 16, 2025. During audio described performances, audience members who are blind or have low vision use a receiver and earpiece to hear about the physical action and visual elements of the production. These descriptions are voiced live, in real time, by a trained describer from Vocal Image Ensemble Winnipeg (VIEW).

## Scholarships and Apprenticeships

Royal MTC's Jean Murray - Moray Sinclair Theatre Scholarship Fund. This fund awards scholarships to successful applicants who are full-time students attending accredited theatre schools, or university theatre programs, and who intend to pursue a career in theatre. This fund also awards apprenticeships to emerging professional artists and craftspeople who are looking for opportunities to gain experience in professional theatre.

Royal MTC awarded a total of **\$32,800** for the 2024/2025 academic year/theatre season. Our generous patrons donated **\$47,917** online and at "pass-the-hat" performances of *Beautiful: The Carole King Musical*, with \$5,000 matched by the Zita and Mark Bernstein Foundation.

## Student Placement

In 2024/25, Royal MTC hosted a student from Seven Oaks Met School for a weekly placement from October – April. Grade 11 student Ehrian worked with Front of House Management, Communications, Education and Enrichment, and Development to help with administrative tasks, research, ushering shows and sourcing media contacts.

### **Enrichment Guides**

Enrichment guides were compiled for all 10 shows of the Mainstage and Warehouse seasons and the Regional Tour. These guides were posted online for educators, students and all other patrons to provide extra insight into our productions. They included plot synopses, playwright biographies, contextual background, glossaries, suggested classroom activities for educators and/or discussion prompts, and links to other resources including books, articles, videos, and podcasts. Creators and contributors included Ksenia Broda-Milian, Tala Gammon, Patrick Derksen, Lori Tully, Elliot Lazar and Sarah Farrant.

## Play on Words

The Winnipeg Public Library's talented Librarians provide amazing **Explore More** reading lists of resources that help you better connect with the play. In 2024/25, librarian-recommended reading lists were created for *Little Women, Waitress, Indecent, Casey and Diana* and *Elevate: Manaaji'idiwin*. These lists may be accessed on MTC's website for anyone who wants to dive deeper.

## **Facility Tours**

The Royal Manitoba Theatre Centre John Hirsch Mainstage is a National Historic site recognized for its contribution to Canadian theatre and for its unique Brutalist architecture. Facility tours provide a look behind the scenes at Royal MTC to gain a unique perspective on how we produce plays. Tours may visit the carpentry shop, wardrobe, props department, and more! As a special event during Culture Days, MTC welcomed over **170 PEOPLE** for mini-tours on September 28, 2024. During the season, we gave tours to approximately **135 PEOPLE** from 7 school and community groups.

## **Backstage Pass**

This season-long program gave Grade 11 and 12 students an in-depth look at theatre. #### **BACKSTAGE PASS WORKSHOPS**

**THE PLAY THAT GOES WRONG** • Brendan McKeen and Donnie Osler took the participants through Royal MTC's hidden spaces to meet our talented craftspeople followed by Education and Enrichment Manager and designer Ksenia Broda-Milian guiding students in set design discussion and creation.

**LITTLE WOMEN** • Fight director and performer Jacquie Loewen helped students see the importance of crafting fight scenes that drive the play's action forward and taught them some impressive moves.

**WAITRESS** • Secrets of theatre magic were revealed by Kari Hagness who shared stories from her time as the MTC Head of Props, and encouraged participants in creating faux food like you'd find at Joe's Pie Diner from unconventional materials.

**INDECENT** • In a theatre career rotation, the teens experienced mock auditions with feedback from Artistic Associate Melissa Langdon, played "stage management Olympics" with SM Katie Robinson Hoppa, and devised campaigns for next season's production of *Elf* under the guidance of Sue Caughlin and Rachelle Blatta from our Marketing and Communications team.

**CASEY AND DIANA** • Education Programs Assistant and actor Honey Pham took the students through a vocal technique class and introduced the connection between the voice and the body in conveying emotion.

**ELEVATE:** MANAAJI'IDIWIN • The participants dove into the creative process of writing for the stage with the guidance of playwright Elio Zarillo in "playwriting boot camp."

## Theatre Under 30

TD Theatre Under 30 is a free membership program for young people aged 18-29. Members have exclusive access to world-class theatre for just \$20 a seat! In the 2024/25 season, 883 MEMBERS PURCHASED A TOTAL OF 2,317 TICKETS throughout the year, an increase of over 800 tickets from the previous year.

## Theatre for Young Audiences

Royal MTC schedules student-only matinee performances for selected productions. This year, MTC offered student-only matinees for six productions: The Play that Goes Wrong (2 performances), Little Women (2 performances), Waitress, Indecent, Casey and Diana and Murder for Two. A total of 3,805 students attended student-only matinee performances and 3,661 students attended regular performances with their school, along with 197 students using promo codes specific to their university classes, for a total of 7,272 STUDENTS at shows this season. ## Connecting with our Community

This past season, Royal MTC renewed efforts to deepen connections with the larger community.

In June 2024, Royal MTC participated in its first Pride Parade with staff, volunteers, actors and more. Despite several delays and extreme temperatures, spirits were high and the community was excited to see Royal MTC in the parade.

Royal MTC was honoured to participate in Fleur de Villes ARTISTE collaboration at The Leaf in January 2025 that celebrated Manitoba's vibrant art scene. This floral display captured an iconic scene from Indecent featuring two women sharing an intimate moment. Special thanks and congratulations to Silver Heights Florists Christine Lyons and Brian Cantlon for their inspired design and winning Best in Show!

In February 2025, Put a Yid on It - Festival of Yiddish Culture, presented by Rady JCC featured the cast from Indecent performing songs from the production.

Royal MTC held a Fireside Chat for staff and board members hosted Mitch Bourbonniere, the Community Outreach Liaison for the Downtown Community Safety Partnership, also a founding member of Bear Clan Patrol, who talked about safety and how our neighbourhood exists around us.

In February 2025, a new role was created: Director of Community Engagement and Audience Development. Colleen Hrabi stepped into this position to help reach and engage community groups and people who are not often represented in our audiences.

The production of Casey and Diana was about more than just the show itself and sparked important conversations and real connections. By working alongside groups like Nine Circles, the Rainbow Resource Centre, Klinic and others, Royal MTC became a place for both reflection and support. A quiet room was set up for patrons to reflect and showcased community quilts; on display was a memorial in honor of Dr. Dick Smith, Manitoba's first AIDS doctor plus a banner of red ribbons in the lobby - a symbol of our ongoing support. Royal MTC made sure the experience was open to as many people as possible, with accessible ticket pricing, a special reception, learning resources, and a partnership with the Canadian Museum for Human Rights (CMHR) to truly honour the legacy and lived experiences of those affected by HIV/AIDS.

ELEVATE: Manaaji'idiwin was another highlight. Royal MTC was honoured to welcome Indigenous community leaders on opening night, and worked together to create an Indigenous medicine wheel, which stayed at the theatre during the run and was then planted in front of the John Hirsch Mainstage as a lasting symbol. We also implemented Indigenous Ticket Pricing - offering deeply-discounted tickets for anyone who identifies as Indigenous or Metis. A dinner-and-show deal with Feast Bistro and Café featured delicious Indigenous dishes, and guests enjoyed Fête's sweetgrass ice cream at the show. Royal MTC also continued a partnership with Manito Ahbee Festival, including special promotions and a personal tour for festival performers.

For the run of King James at the Warehouse, Royal MTC teamed up with the Winnipeg Sea Bears to promote the show during basketball season, and partnered with St. James Burger to create and promote the first theatre-themed burger.

In the spring a crew of staff and board members participated in community wide clean up with the Exchange Biz District.

Royal MTC took pride in showcasing local businesses at the bar, serving up only 🌞 Canadian brands - including popular local mainstays like Fête Ice Cream, Empty Cup, Cranked Energy Bars, Little Brown Jug and Torque Brewing to name a few.

All in all, it's been an exciting year full of new partnerships, fresh faces in the audience, and many reasons to celebrate our growing community.
